What is litter?

Littering is the unlawful disposal of any type of waste material that is less than 200 litres in volume (about the volume of a wheelie bin). In Queensland, the unlawful deposit of any amount of waste is an offence, and penalties apply.

Each year, thousands of tonnes of rubbish is littered in Queensland.

It can be anything from an apple core, cigarette butt, drink container or food wrappers to household items, such as a small appliance, chair or bags of clothing.

Littering is serious, unhealthy, unsightly and unsafe

Litter dropped in streets, along the side of the road, or in bushland pollutes our natural environment, and can be washed or blown into creeks, waterways and ocean environments.

It can cause great harm and suffering to animals that may get entangled in the waste or ingest the littered items. Food wastes on roadsides can attract animals to busy roads increasing the danger to both drivers and the animals.

Dangerous littering is litter that causes, or is likely to cause, harm to a person, property or the environment, and higher penalties apply. This may include throwing a lit cigarette butt into bushland, leaving a hypodermic needle in a park, or smashing a glass bottle on a footpath.

It's easy to help

Report littering

If you see someone littering from a motor vehicle, trailer or vessel you can report them at www.qld.gov.au/litter.

Report litter by pinning the location and uploading photos to the report.

Make sure you get as many details as you can, including:

- time, date, place and description of litter
- registration number, make/model, colours, or distinguishing features of vehicle
- description of the person making the offence (including location in vehicle, clothing, gender).

Remember it is illegal to use your mobile phone while driving and for your own safety do not approach the person depositing the waste.
