Tips for reducing your waste these holidays


The festive season can be both a busy and relaxing time for Queenslanders. Make avoiding and reducing your waste stress free with these simple tips.

Palm Island bins keeping Country clean

Palm Island Aboriginal Shire Council has successfully reduced the amount of litter and illegal dumping in the community after installing 20 vandal-proof waste bins in high traffic locations.

Students from two local schools designed the artwork or 'bin wraps' for the bins. The designs reflect how litter and illegal dumping can negatively impact land and sea while celebrating their community and its landscape.



The bins have been placed in locations including the jetty, foreshore, parks and playgrounds. Since their instalment, there been a reduction in litter and an increased sense of pride in keeping the community clean.

This project was funded by the Department of Environment and Science.

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
